The Romanesque church of San Martin in La Cortinada, in Andorra, was built in the 12th century, and was expanded in the 17th and 18th centuries.

It is a beautiful example of medieval architecture made famous by a set of four baroque altarpieces, wrought iron gates and colorful murals painted in the late 12th century.

Among the most prominent images on these murals is a fantastic blue animal with a forked tongue, which some art historians identify as a lion, but others consider to be a wolf. It is difficult to make a certain determination, as the animal has features of both beasts, so it could possibly be a fantastic composite creature which is a result of the imagination of the unknown artist.

In 1982, the postal authority of Andorra's French Administration issued a single stamp depicting this mural (Scott 299), and in 2014, the Spanish Administration issued a souvenir sheet depicting a close-up of the creature (Scott 404).**
